John Marshall is best known as the “Great Chief Justice” for his role in creating the modern Supreme Court. He served from 1801 until 1835 and his influential decisions, such as Marbury v. Madison, helped shape the principle of judicial review. With the largest collection of original Marshall family pieces, guided tours of his home offer an in-depth look at the formation of American government through the lens of the federal judiciary.

What to do at the John Marshall House

- **Guided Tour:** 45 minutes, interpreters cover the life and legacy of Chief Justice John Marshall.
- **Self-guided Exhibit:** 20 minutes for self-guided tour of the Justice Gallery, a contemporary rotating exhibit space that brings current judicial topics to light through art.
- **Museum Store:** Books and souvenirs available for purchase.
- **Urban Garden Space:** Outdoor seating is available as is for up to 20 people. Outdoor area can be tented for up to 150 people.
- **Community Meeting Space:** Indoor space available for smaller groups of up to 25 people.

Parking

- **Reserved parking** for up to 4 buses can be pre-arranged directly in front of the house.
- **Metered street parking** is available on a first-come, first-served basis.
- **Public parking lot** on 9th and Clay Streets (2 blocks away).

Restrooms: Single stall men and single stall women’s restrooms available for public use.
